Traditional Whole Cloth Quilt

Traditional Whole Cloth Mystery Quilt-Along Supply List Designed by Cindy Roth

This quit is a very traditional whole cloth quilt. Choose a fabric that is a solid or a fabric with a small or barely noticeable print. We WANT our quilting to show!

I highly recommend pre-washing both your top and backing fabric to avoid possible / probably shrinkage.

The piecing of this quilt top is fairly easy - be as accurate as you can especially with the borders. You do not want wavy borders for this quilt!

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Items you will need for the quilting -

Thread - Use whatever thread works in your quilting machine. Below are some suggestions for thread.

Basting Thread - Because of the feather / pattern placement we will be basting the quilt top before the actual quilting. You will get complete details on how to do this in the class videos. When basting a quilt top, I prefer to use a high sheen polyester, or any other "slippery" thread in an "obnoxious" color such as international orange or neon pink! These colors stand out and the slippery thread pulls out MUCH easier than cotton thread!

Feather Quilting - For this quilt, WANT the quilting to show! For the feather work I highly recommend using a contrasting thread color for the quilting! We are also going to be making a LOT of registration lines and a contrasting thread will make your quilting "stand out" and be much easier to see!

Fill In Stitching- For the background fill in stitching use a thread that matches your fabric. We want this quilting to "disappear" into the fabric.

Marking Pens. I prefer the Fine Point Crayola Washable Markers. Note - to remove the marker, the quilt **MUST** be washed in warm water, with detergent, in a washing machine.

There is going to be a **LOT** of marking on this quilt and we will be using different color markers for marking different areas / designs. **I suggest getting a brand new set of the Crayola Washable Markers.**

Straight edge rotary cutting rulers for marking registration lines.

Piecing template material - We are going to be making templates which we will be drawing around and using as quilting guides. These templates work best if they are made from **PIECING plastic** template material. This material can be found in most quilting and chain fabric stores.

IMPORTANT - The templates we will be making are up to 14 inches wide. I have found that **HEAVY DUTY** template plastic works best. I recommend Dritz Heavy Duty Template Plastic which comes in a 12×18 inch sheet. All the templates we need can be cut from <u>2 sheets</u> of this plastic.

If you can't find this type of template plastic, that's ok. Your templates may be a bit "floppy" but they will work!
